Welcome to your Algebra 1CP class. The purpose of this class is to introduce and strengthen algebraic skills. With the adoption of the new Common Core Content Standards, there will be more integration of critical thinking, problem-solving, partner work and group work than what you might be used to up to now.

There will be times when this class might be different than other math classes you might have had. For example, there will be times when I ask you to do thumbs up and thumbs down to show me an answer, we will use whiteboards, and we might even use games, music and different kind of activities. Regardless of the activity that we are doing, everybody is expected to be fully engaged and participating at all times – like Jerry Mortensen said, "Math is not a spectator sport". Above all, try to have a positive attitude about math, regardless of the type of experience you might have had in the past.

Materials recommended:

1) Lined white paper

Classroom rules

Remember that you are here to learn. Therefore, the following behavior will be expected of you every day:

1) Be on time and prepared.

You must be in your seat when the bell rings, and have your textbook with you every day.

- 2) Show respect to yourself, others, and their property.
- 3) Finish any conversation, eating, drinking or grooming before entering the classroom.

Gum, eating, drinking, grooming, and conversations not assigned by the teacher are not allowed during class. We need to keep our classroom clean and ourselves focused on the subject.

4) Put all non-instructional and distracting items away.

As mandated by the school, electronic devices, including iPods and cell phones, are not allowed during class.

The use of any non-instructional or distracting item is subject to confiscation and detention.

5) Obey all school rules.

These and other consequences may be applied at the teacher's discretion. (This list is not in any particular order.)
Rewards, on the other hand, may include praise, positive notes, homework passes, and other rewards as teacher sees fit.

Tardy policy

Arriving to class after the bell is considered an "unexcused tardy" unless you have a pass. Excessive tardies may result in school disciplinary action, so make sure to arrive on time.

Homework policy

Physical homework (there will be times when the homework will be to study) will be stamped for completion the day it is due, graded during class and collected afterwards. Late homework will be accepted for partial credit only under special circumstances.

Notes and warm-ups packet

Notes and warm-ups will be submitted at the end of the unit in a packet. There will be a checklist to use to put your packet together. You will have to include your scores and add them up, staple the checklist on top of the packet, and have your packet ready to submit at the door the day it is due. If a student is caught giving him/herself more credit than he/she obtained, he/she will be subject to academic and/or disciplinary action.

Make-up work

If you are absent, you may find your missing assignments on my website (listed above). You may obtain anything not listed on the website from a classmate. Due to the nature of some activities, make-ups are not always possible.

Tests and quizzes

We will normally have practice quizzes and tests before the actual quizzes and tests. The tendency to be absent on days of quizzes and/or tests could result in the student having to take an assessment different than the rest of the class.

Challenges of the week/Performance tasks

Throughout the year, we will be working on problems or questions that require analysis and skills application. It is important to not feel discouraged by these assignments and complete each one of these assignments as their main purpose is to develop analytical skills.

Checking your grade

Grades will be posted periodically on the window outside the classroom. However, your parent(s)/guardian(s) and you either have or will have access to your grades on Q, our grading system. It is your responsibility to check your grade on a regular basis. If you need to speak to me about your grade, please see me or send me an e-mail.

Help

We will be working with partners and groups throughout the year. If you still need help with the homework or a topic covered in class, you may see me for extra help at a time that is convenient for both of us (see me or e-mail me to figure out what time works), or by attending Link Crew or after-school tutoring. Make sure to ask for help if you need it.
